Ted Williams (1918-2002) is regarded by many as the greatest player in Boston Red Sox history. In a career that spanned from 1939-42 and 1946-60, Ted amassed career totals of a .344 batting average and 521 home runs, both Red Sox career records. Ted also played in 18 All-Star Games and the 1946 World Series against the St. Louis Cardinals. Ted was elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1966 and the Red Sox Hall of Fame in 1995.
